Time to Listen -Time for Reflection

It's always a great temptation to turn a Group Reunion into a time for discussion but, as with everything in Cursillo, it has been well thought out, tried and tested and uses the format for very good reasons.



In allowing each person within the group to speak without interruption or comment gives them an opportunity to really focus and reflect on their own personal relationship with God more fully and to discover more about themselves in the process within a safe and secure environment. Often it is in the speaking out aloud that we discover far more about ourselves and our faith than we ever thought possible which means that it's very important to be able to do this in an atmosphere of confidence and trust. It is the responsibility of each person in the Group to listen attentively and to give space, time and silence to the speaker as this is part of the vital work of sustaining the sacred centre for each of us - listening carefully to one another increases our capability and capacity to listen to God.

It's the task of the leader for each meeting to ensure that everyone has the opportunity to speak if they wish to and to discourage any discussion or hi-jacking of someone's space. Of course we're in the business of love, care, companionship, sustaining and encouragement of one another but listening with, and in, grace is an essential part of that.

With the permission of the Group members it's always possible to have discussion after the Reunion, perhaps over coffee (& cake), but the main work remains personal reflection and attentive listening.

ULTREYA GB 2010

On Saturday morning, 4th September, I opened the curtains of my bedroom in a lovely B & B just outside Ripon to see a car which had arrived the previous evening sporting a GB Ultreya programme, complete with Rainbow, on its dashboard. The party from Edinburgh all



remembered Matthew and Miriam, and we found plenty to talk about at breakfast.

The day started at Ripon Grammar School, with registration and coffee in the Assembly area with Alison Askew, whose mother was on the organising committee, doing "step duty". We moved to the Sports Hall, complete with a climbing wall which looked as if it had been decorated for the occasion with brightly coloured handholds, etc. As always we started with singing – all the old favourites plus a lovely hymn "Colourful Lord" which had been written for Wakefield #18 by Pamela Greener. We were welcomed by Lay Director, John Speller and Spiritual Director, Wilf Gowing, as well as by the Mayor of Ripon and Bishop John Packer who spent the whole day with us. The thought of hundreds of people holding group re-unions in the Hall was mind-boggling, but it worked surprisingly well - something about the acoustics made it possible for us to be in close proximity with each other but still manage to hear ourselves and others in the group speak. Two friends who used to live in Standlake and discovered Cursillo in Derby joined the group I was in, so that made it very special.

The Action Talk was given by a lady who very simply lives a life of Action for the Lord – seeing needs and meeting them in the people she comes across in her daily life; this was followed by the Gospel response in which we learnt more than we needed to know about Paul Kennington's feet (!) before he talked about Jesus washing the feet of those He served. Lynn Radcliffe's Presidential Address included the introduction of the National Spiritual Director elect, Bishop Idris, recently retired Bishop of Glasgow and Galloway and Primus of the Episcopal Church of Scotland, who had been nominated by the Oxford Secretariat – Matthew and Angela both know him and his wife well.

The morning programme ended early (a first?!) and I caught up with Angela Linton briefly before going our separate ways for lunch, which

could be at the School, in a Church on the way to the Cathedral or in the town, before gathering in the Cathedral for the Service. There was a short procession of witness by banner bearers and supporters down a pedestrianised street opposite the Cathedral – the cost of closing roads in order to process further was prohibitive. The body of the Cathedral was packed, the only spare seats being in the side aisles. It was a lovely service, with prayers and singing by the Northumbrian Community. The Dean of Ripon started his address telling us about his involvement with the church as a boy: he failed to gain entry to the choir because he could not sing; he was sacked as a server for being the only person to "put out the Light of the World" and as an acolyte for setting fire to the crucifer. Despite this, God had plans for him and eventually he was ordained and after "failing as a parish priest" he became Dean of Ripon Cathedral. He then preached in more normal vein, on the readings from Ephesians chapter 4 and John 21:15-17.



During the rousing rendition of "Thine be the Glory" the banners were processed out of the Cathedral and we all departed, some going home and others staying for a Hog Roast and Barn Dance in the evening.

It was an extremely well organised event and very uplifting.

Next year GB Ultreya will be in Lincoln. Do think about going – it is a wonderful experience.

At the time of writing, Oxford #8, our first weekend at Douai, is not many weeks away. We have a full complement of Guests and will be running the weekend with three tables. The team is in place and has already started training for the Weekend.

That we have got to this point is the result of a lot of hard work behind the scenes, much prayer, and many long conversations deep into the night. As we had always suspected, the move to Douai has given us the opportunity to do rather more than fine-tuning what we already had.

As you know, the essentials of the three day weekend are the fifteen talks, five meditations and daily Eucharist. Strangely, then, it is often the add-ons that have become part of Cursillo that occupy a lot of the thinking and energy, and that is where we have to place the focus of much of our attention.

What happens next?

Moving Cursillo weekends from one venue to another is almost like putting on another #1. However much we have planned for the change, it is only when we have run the weekend that wed know what really worked and what didnd. At that point we can run a thorough review, and make any adjustments that are necessary, and consider any changes that were made during #8, to see if they should

be retained. No small task, with the next weekend already only six months away.

What can you do next?

Oxford #8 was fully subscribed four months in advance and several people had to be disappointed. We can therefore expect much earlier applications for future weekends. So, if you are thinking of sponsoring someone for #9, **now** is the time to start praying about it, thinking about it, and doing something about it. I have been living in Oxford and worshipping in Cowley St John parish for over 30 years, and I made my Cursillo over twenty years ago in Gloucester. I was the only one from the parish who went but there were some people from Cowley parish and we formed a small group and kept in touch – but there weren't any e-mails or websites then, and when the Cowley people all moved on I lost touch with everyone. Gradually Cursillo became just a fond memory.

I had no idea that Cursillo had come to Oxford Diocese until two years ago when I was talking to Sr Barbara June over coffee after a Sunday morning service. She had been talking to an ex-curate from our parish who had said 'Oh, Gilly knows all about Cursillo'... Well, I had done but was very out of touch. This was not a chance conversation: it was an answer to prayer. I was looking for guidance as to what I was supposed to be doing next in my Christian journey but not trying very hard, and now I had had a shove in the right direction. I found the website, discovered Cursillistas on my doorstep, was absorbed into a reunion group and was back in the fold. When I went on my own to my first Ultreya I walked into the room feeling quite apprehensive as there was no-one there I knew. I needn't have worried: the love which greeted me was almost tangible – I have never felt so welcomed anywhere.

I was very pleased to be invited to be on the staff at oxford #7: being Rollo Room Gofer meant I had a chance to be part of a weekend and it brought back a lot of what I had experienced so long ago. It was also a chance to find out what was different about an Oxford weekend.

My friend, who was a guest on Oxford #7 had such a wonderful experience on her weekend and was bubbling over so much that people were asking her what she'd been up to. She asked me why I had sponsored her at that particular time - which was because I had just found my way back to the Cursillo community – and it was her enthusiasm that stopped me from taking a back seat and letting everyone else do it all.

My favourite place is in the background being unobtrusive, but if you stay in the background it is much more difficult to make anything happen. I realised that I had something important to talk about, and that what I wanted to do was share Cursillo with as many people as possible. That was my task and I needed to think about how to do it.
