CURSILLO LEADERS' WORKSHOP REPORT: 4-6 August 2006 By Jill Iredale

In high summer in the beautiful Warwickshire countryside, 22 Cursillistas travelling from many parts of England met together at Offa House, for one of the three Cursillo Leaders' Workshops (CLW) which are held annually.

Mike and Pat Hobday form Coventry and Jean Radley from Cumbria were the small Weekend Team who welcomed Angela, Mary and me upon our arrival on the Friday evening. We soon met up with other participants from Blackburn, Sheffield, Worcester, London Carlisle, Ely, Lincoln and Portsmouth. After supper and introductions we began what was to be a busy weekend schedule of talks, discussions and worship – oh, and eating of course – the chef at Offa House is good! On this first evening, after an opening Ultreya, we looked again at what it means to be 'The Church', before Evening Prayer in the Chapel.

An early start with Morning Prayer on Saturday allowed a full day to look at many aspects of Cursillo afresh: The Fourth Day, the Servant Community, Pre-Cursillo, the authentic 3-day Weekend, building the Cursillo Community and the work of the British Anglican Cursillo Council (BACC). Discussion times with other people were encouraging and helpful, especially for those Dioceses – like ours – who have just started running Weekends and are experiencing a variety of concerns.

'In deep gratitude for this moment, this meal, these people, we give ourselves to you'. Late morning Eucharists on both Saturday and Sunday gave the right perspective and also gave those who wished an opportunity to take part by reading, praying or serving.

Music ran throughout the Weekend with two Cursillistas sharing the worship song accompaniment and another providing splendid accordion accompaniment at the social singing and dancing on Saturday evening.

Sunday allowed us to look at Cursillo Leadership, Deepening out Union with God and the Job Ahead, but there was also time for Two by Two dialogue with a space to share – with a chosen person – some of our life experiences, and to pray for one another.

Then suddenly it was Sunday lunchtime and time to say goodbye; to return to our own Dioceses and the little part of God's planet where we are asked to serve.

BUILDING FIRMER FOUNDATIONS

Sadly the planned Oxford 3 Weekend had to be postponed. Ten of us attended the retreat at Cold Ash for both Saturday and Sunday, two came for Saturday only and Peter Watsham dropped in for a couple of hours. We spent time in worship, prayer, socialising, listening to 4 talks and on Sunday morning discussing where we were and what action we needed to take.

Many thanks to Mike and Jean Whitton, Father Iain, and Cliff Scott, who gave talks on Reunion groups, the Fourth Day, Sponsorship and The Servant Community. They gave us more understanding about Cursillo and we were given time to think about and discuss the issues raised.

We also passed an hour on Saturday evening in prayer vigil for the Wakefield 29 Weekend at which Suzy Webster from Oxford Diocese was a guest.

Three points of action and understanding came from this weekend.

1) **Sponsorship**

This is a much misunderstood word and too often is not done well. The word is taken from the use of Sponsors in Baptism. It has nothing to do with raising money by sponsoring people for charitable events! We all agreed that a much better word to use would be **MENTOR**. The mentor is both advisor and, most importantly, responsible for praying for the person being sponsored for a Weekend.

2) **Reunion groups**

The building blocks of Cursillo are the Reunion Groups. Is everyone a member of a reunion group? Do the groups meet regularly? Are they healthy? Is there a Key Person for each Group? The Secretariat has begun to look at our situation, and, in the New Year, will try to help those who are struggling.

3) Prayer

Cursillo is based on prayer. Jacquie provided a wall of paper bricks with the name of each person on our mailing list written on one brick. We realized that as individuals we did not know all these people or whether they had access to reunion groups. It was unanimously decided that a Prayer Diary was required, and that we would use names only and not titles. The Diary for December and January is inserted into this magazine. We would be grateful if you could use this Diary; as we are so few it is not asking a lot. The names have been randomly listed and will continue to be so. Thank you.
