Apart from preparing for Oxford #11 Cursillo seems to be rather quiet at present and I know that Terry would love to hear from anyone willing to host an Ultreya. The winter Ultreyas in Witney and Swallowfield were well attended and it was good to welcome new Cursillistas.

Mary and I are off to the BACC AGM and Catch the Vision weekend in May and I am looking forward to an exciting event.

I am also looking forward to seeing as many of you as possible at Clausura on 29th April when Bishop Andrew will be presiding for the first time and we will welcome our new Cursillistas. A "welcome" Ultreya is planned in Abingdon on 19th May when it is hoped new Cursillistas will come along with their sponsors to start their 4th Day journey.

The Week after Easter....

'Twas the week after Easter and all through the house not a creature was stirring, not even a mouse.



The rhyme doesn't really go like that, I know, but it struck me recently how appropriate the adaptation is. The round of post-Easter worship is so keen to 'hype' us up during the Easter season that we easily forget the tone and atmosphere of the 'fourth day' as the biblical story unfolds at the end of the Gospels and in the Book of Acts. The disciples leave Jerusalem for Galilee where Jesus has promised to meet them. And then what? The fact is, we don't know; we must largely surmise. Whatever went on during that period of six or seven weeks it somehow emboldened Peter to return to Jerusalem for the Feast of Weeks (Pentecost) and to begin an eloquent ministry of preaching. How can we account for that?

The most sensible view is that the 'fourth day', meaning the period after the resurrection, was a time for the disciples and other followers to piece together the startling and unexpected workings of God in Jesus of Nazareth; a time for weaving the extraordinary thoughts, words and deeds of their time with Jesus into a coherent case and message.

It is rightly said that the Cursillo movement is more about the Fourth Day than about the weekend itself. The Fourth Day is for the cursillista just what the fourth day was for the disciples: a time to piece together in a new, life-giving and share-able manner what following 'the Way' is about. That weaving-together task is vital if we're to speak of God's work from a point of interior authenticity. But that is surely the centre from which compelling discipleship flows. However living the waters may be, they issue from a silent, reflective source of Fourth Day experience: hidden, meditative, weaving the Scriptures into a mirror of Christ.


May this Eastertide be a Fourth Day season when we all work to piece together all that God did in Jesus, and consider afresh how it can make us resurrection's children.

Servant Community Day



On the 28th January twenty-five Cursillistas met at St Helen's Church Centre, Abingdon to examine what being part of a Cursillo Servant Community involves and what creating one in Oxford could mean to the movement.



The Servant Community is an essential element of any Diocesan Cursillo Movement, without a support group of people dedicated to carrying out the essential behind the scenes work the organisation could not operate.

David Atkinson spoke on Pre-Cursillo, Peter Watsham (on behalf of Alison Askew) spoke on Weekends and Terri Pitt spoke about the development of the Fourth Day that would be possible given time and willing people. They all gave information about their groups and the volunteers that are urgently required at the moment. Elsewhere in this copy of Oxon Fourth you will find details of help that is needed that has come from the day, please consider if you can help.

Revd. Charles Miller presented the doctrinal talk on Vocation calling on us all to answer God's call to us, and Peter Watsham explained more of the detail of the Servant Community.

We then formed into groups to discuss a series of questions which produced some important and revealing answers, particularly that we need to increase our efforts to publicise Cursillo and the importance of ensuring new Cursillistas are supported in their Fourth Day, into Group Reunion and Ultreya!

Secretariat and the Servant Community will be considering the results of the questionnaire, together with those from the on-line survey and we hope to develop these new ideas over the next year or two.

The Survey

A big "Thank You" to everyone who took the time to respond to the internet survey - it is hoped your answers will guide and lead us to improve those areas within our Cursillo Group that are currently not as good as they could be.

It is important to say that these notes are the personal observation of the 4th Day Convenor and should not be deemed to represent official opinion or policy.

General Assessment

The amount of useful information produced from this survey is very extensive and it will take a long time to effectively tackle all the "matters arising" which have been shown to be in need of attention and improvement. The following is a summary of a report given at the last meeting of the Secretariat.

From the information gathered the top priorities to be addressed were manifestly obvious by the volume of similar responses and the following conclusions may be drawn:-

- a) We need to acquaint everyone with information on "Days of Deeper Understanding" and arrange to hold a DDU as soon as practicable.
- b) A lot of constructive work needs to be done with Group Reunions ensuring that everyone who wants to belong to one and meet on a regular basis is able to do so. We need to urgently address the situation of some cursillistas who want to be able to meet in a Group Reunion but currently find it very difficult to do so.
- c) Almost everyone who replied has attended at least one Ultreya and been in contact with the Cursillo organisation in the past year. A small minority of respondees are prevented at present and we need to find ways of facilitating their attendance.

This should be one of the areas which the 4th day team concentrates first.

d) Whilst Oxon Fourth is read with great interest by the vast majority of Cursillistas, a preference for more personal and spiritual articles was expressed by many.

Perhaps some readers would care to submit articles of the type they would like to be included and there could be a regular column for Readers' Opinions, which would hopefully reflect the popularity (or otherwise) of subject matter.

This is not an exhaustive summary of the results received and it is hoped that an analysis of all aspects of the accumulated information can be analysed as an ongoing exercise over time.

Fourth Day in Action....

On Wednesday 25th January I awoke fully intending to attend a course in Oxford, but God had other plans for me. I received some very clear instructions from God: I was to go to Starbucks at Peartree Services and He would send me someone He wanted me to meet. All I had to do was WAIT and God would guide me with the rest. I was torn between wanting to go to my course and doing what I felt God was calling me to do, especially as I wasn't entirely sure what it was all about. There was however really no decision to be made. I knew I had to go. Looking back I am so glad that I was obedient to God's call rather than pursuing my own interests as the situation taught me many things which have enriched my faith and encouraged me on my walk with Christ.

To cut a very long story shorter I went to Peartree armed with a couple of different versions of the Bible as I knew the 'wait' might be quite lengthy and it was a good opportunity for PRAYER and STUDY. The wait was indeed long but I was rooted to the spot. Besides I was actually quite enjoying reading 'Word on the Street' the street Bible my husband had thrust in my hand as I was leaving. Eventually, a man (later found to be called Keith) came and sat at the table next to me and again I wondered if this was the one I was to meet. I continued to wait for the 'further instructions' I had been promised. Finally I could wait no longer for the bathroom and praise God the instruction came. I was to leave the street Bible on the table and go to the bathroom but knew I was to return to the same seat afterwards. On my return Keith said "I'm glad you came back" Apparently in my absence he had discussed with his neighbour whether I would come back for the book. The other man had concluded that it was probably not a good book and that I had just left it. Keith had not been so convinced. I assured him it was actually a very good book and offered it to him. He looked tempted but didn't immediately accept the offer. I was convinced I was to give him the book and waited for the right time. As he stood up to leave he said goodbye and I again offered him the book, telling him that it was for him. Gratefully he accepted the offer and briefly examined the book. He quickly sat down again, clearly moved, and told me how appropriate it might be for him, as he had recently become homeless. Keith told me his story and I in turn told him about how I came to be there. Later we parted company and Keith left armed with a manageable version of God's word.

The reason I have related this story to you is not for any self aggrandisement but so that I can share with you some of the lessons I learnt. I discovered countless things, too many to detail here, but want to leave you with a couple of thoughts. I am not very good at 'letting go and letting God' but knew I had to leave Keith in God's hands. It wasn't about me bringing Keith to faith but it was about me making the introduction and leaving them to develop the relationship. Secondly, it was about the importance of having a support network for your spiritual journey. When I left Keith he had no network to support him. I resolved to pray for him and wanted others to pray too, hence my prayer request to all Oxford Cursillistas. I am extremely grateful I have Cursillo as my support network and would encourage everyone to make good use of it in this way. After all Cursillo is not just about the weekend - it is the 4th Day that matters.
