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


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

patterns of joy and discovery.


For all this, we cannot bear to look on him,

He can cry there. He can be frank with God during the night terrors,


and admit that he is at the end of himself.

From the National Spiritual Director, Rev'd Hugh Burgess:-

Dear Friends

As I sit here in the early morning listening to the dawn chorus in the peace of Shepherds Dene (a wonderful retreat house near Hexham, in beautiful Nothumberland), the words of that great hymn "the strife is o'er, the battle done" comes to mind. I suspect that for many people (and not least the clergy) the opening words of this hymn sum up the immediate relief that the rush of Passiontide, Holy Week and Easter is over. This can be such a busy time, full of frantic activity, of emotions that rang from the sorrow of Good Friday to the joy of Easter Day, that we can simply end up feeling as though we've gone through



the mangle. I rather suspect that for the early disciples it was much the same: The range of emotions experienced in such a short time would have been very draining.

I was reading the other day that in 2011 only about half the total number of people who attended Church of England Christmas services attended at Easter. You may also have seen the story about the supermarket commercial buyer who asked someone (I think from The Real Easter Egg Company, but I may be wrong) what Easter had to do with the church! These things seem to suggest that the importance and significance of the Easter message is increasingly being lost on the general population. In a sense it's a similar phenomenon to that which we remember in Holy Week: Many of those who cheered on Palm Sunday were probably the same ones who jeered on Good Friday. Easter is somehow seen as less important than the joy of new birth at Christmas.

Years ago someone said to me that if you see the average congregation arriving at church they can look as though they are going to the dentist to have a tooth pulled ... And when they come out it's as though they have!

The temptation for us after Easter is to "get back to normal" and yet the joy of Easter is something that we should strive to hold onto. This, for me, is one of the great wonders of Cursillo, that it is full of joyful souls who are very definitely "Easter people". We are people who express the very joy of having discovered what a deep relationship with God and with one another means. This doesn't mean that things are not sometimes very tough, that we can feel very low or far away from God, but we have experienced some of that joy, too. That is an experience we need to hold onto and to witness to.


The joy of Easter, I believe, is founded on two truths, both of which depend on the other. Easter is the fulfilment of God's redeeming love seen in Jesus' death on Good Friday and God's saving love seen in the raising up of the same Jesus on Easter Sunday. Resurrection

with Redemption, or Redemption without Resurrection are each incomplete. As Easter People we celebrate the healing that comes in redemption and the life that comes through resurrection... and neither redemption nor resurrection stopped at the end of Easter Day! This is why the joy cannot cease and why we need to avoid the dental faces if we can!

More crucially (a word that has its root in the Latin word for a cross) our challenge as joyful Cursillistas is to carry our Easter joy out to the rest of the church. I would like to encourage every Cursillista to share the Cursillo way of Prayer, Study and Action in the community of the small group with as many people as possible outside the Movement. This is not to "sell" Cursillo, not to get more people into the Movement, but rather to share the joy that we have discovered with the wider church and through the church with the wider world. This is the mission of Cursillo going forwards, to be yeast in our congregations bringing some of that Easter joy into the mix, showing people that while "the battle is o'er, the strife is done" this is only the beginning of the story because "the song of triumph has begun! Alleluia!"

God is kind all of the time, but not the kind that pretends not to notice the abuse of love. All of the time God is truthful.


God is truthful all of the time, but does not trumpet the wrongs of others, preferring to endure.

Book Reviews

A Handful of Fire by Carole Marie Kelly. (23rd Publications)

This is a wonderful book, subtitled Praying Contemplatively with Scripture. Sr Carole Marie is a Franciscan contemplative who has lived for twenty years in solitude in Carmel, California following on from her work as an educator, cross-cultural consultant and spiritual director. Many books by American Christian writers are a little florid for my taste but this one is very calming and thoughtfully composed.



The 'Fire' of the title is the Holy Spirit, the Divine Wisdom "who can in flame our faith and inspire us to realise the treasure of union with God(which) has already been given to us and lies within our hearts".

The book is in three sections. In the first, "Approaching the Fire", SSr Carole Marie introduces various methods of reading Scripture to uncover its hidden depths of meaning. In the second part, "Touching the Fire", she guides us through the various types of writings in our Bible: history, psalms, prophecy, parables, etc and unlocks an example of each. The studies in part three, "Being Fire", point to the heart of the scriptural message, and these concluding meditations "lead us to respond generously to the grace of God (and) to reach out to the Christ in others, spreading the divine flame".

There is much in each these contemplative studies, which are about 5-6 pages long, for everyone who desires to draw deeper and closer to the heart of the Father through "a fuller experience of the power, the light and the mystery of Scripture" - which must surely include every Cursillista. There are passages here which will encourage those preparing some of our rollos, faith and grace and piety for example. As we hold the Bible we are indeed holding a handful of fire which can transform the world.

Dear Fellow Cursillistas.

As Cursillistas we never really know what impact sharing our faith with fellow Christians has nor how many we touch with our 'action', however small it may seem. As Cursillistas we need to be always ready to do some 'planting' where we are as well as 'blooming where we are planted'. None of this, of course, can be achieved without looking into our own churches and communities and identifying, perhaps with others too, where the needs are and reflecting on the gifts we have been given and asking what Christ would have us do.

In order for these actions to be taken we know, as Cursillistas, that we cannot achieve, maintain or sustain such projects without the support of our own Group Reunion and the help of the wider Cursillo community. To this end Hugh and I have been working with another small group of Dioceses to share the Cursillo method in every church in one particular Diocese (to begin with) where we have the encouragement of the Bishop. Another Diocesan Cursillo has shared the Cursillo method with others and are already in the process of introducing it in one Deanery. Hugh will, I think, be sharing more of these exciting ideas with us.

Cursillo needs to be a tool for Church growth and as Cursillistas we need to be willing to offer our prayerful help and support in the best way that we can. Of course we also

need to offer others the chance to share in the challenges, self-examination and the overwhelming experience of Christ's love for each and every one of us on a Cursillo weekend and to lead others (perhaps some younger members of your congregations?) into the strength and support of a Group Reunion and Ultreyas.

So - plenty of challenges for all of us as we move forward!

May the real joy and reassurance of Easter morning stay with us as we seek to be spiritfilled Christians at work renewing the face of the earth.

Visit to Bonnin's grave

Eduardo Bonnín Aguiló, Founder of the Cursillos in Christianity Movement.

Eduardo Bonnin was born in Palma, Mallorca in 1917 and it was there he died in 2008. Eduardo was laid to rest in the Church of the Capuchin Priests (Iglesia de los Padres Capuchinos), his tomb is in the entryway of this church. In 2014, the mayor of Palma presided at the naming of a short street in Eduardo's honour close to the church where the founder of the Cursillo movement is buried.

Billy Hollis, former Lay Director of Canterbury Cursillo and Cursillista wife Mary enjoyed a Western Mediterranean cruise in October last and one of the stops was Palma, Mallorca.

Determined to find the grave of Eduardo, Billy and Mary set off from the cruise terminal and after some setbacks mainly due to a lack of Catalan/Spanish linguistic ability, they discovered the Church of the Capuchin Priests which was firmly locked!!

However, they did interpret from a sign on the door that it would be open for confessions at 7.00 pm and fortunately the return time to the cruise ship was not until 11.30 pm. The short street named after Eduardo was soon found and many photos taken. They returned at 7.00 pm and were delighted to see before them in the entrance of the church, the final




resting place of the founder of the Cursillo movement.

Cursillo in Chichester... Is God bothered?

It's no bad thing to look in the rear view mirror on our journey of faith, but if you are anything like me - a little short on patience - you probably wish that God would reveal just a glimpse of His plan!

I believe that the Cursillo weekend course provides that very opportunity... the Holy Spirit gently revealed a glimpse of God's plan for me, and not in the way I could have expected.



Well, it all started in the bedroom at Wychcroft! But more about that later...

In a recent conversation I was asked if I would send in an article for the forthcoming edition of 'Faith is Sussex'. A prophetic word spoken to Pauline during one of the meditations, though overwhelming, came as no surprise.

Pauline had spent time talking to the spiritual director about a nagging itch, uncertain as to whether she was doing something that God wanted her to stop, or, not doing something He wanted her to do?

Well, their response was: "I feel God could be calling you to the Priesthood", Pauline's "... Yes I know" confirmed to her that this was the call she'd been trying to avoid!

I can honestly say to you that my future role as the Vicar's husband is not just something I have embraced, but actually feel excited about and, by God's grace - I believe called - to offer this gift of support.

From Leicester with love!

I write this on the day when the mortal remains of King Richard III are being re-interned. For the past few months it seems as though the City of Leicester and its cathedral are the centre of the universe. TV crews from Britain, Europe and further afield are camped in the environs of the cathedral; crowds have thronged the streets for the procession of his mortal remains to Bosworth battlefield and back into the city. It is estimated that up to 38 thousand people lined the route and massive queues have waited to file past his coffin; as many as 20,000 people in the past two and a half days.

But all has been done with the great dignity and with the respect due to a King of our island nation, whatever Shakespeare, the Tudors and history itself have made of his character. Yet despite the great number of visitors, there has been a reverent hush inside the cathedral. In his sermon at the Office of Compline as Richard's body was received into the cathedral, the Roman Catholic Cardinal Archbishop Vincent Nicholls made the point that Richard was a baptised and indeed a very devout Christian who did many good things with the power he held, including establishing the presumption of innocence and setting up the system of bail for some offenders before trial. King Richard's RC heritage was taken fully into account in the planning of all the liturgies of the past few days.

Next week, our cathedral and churches and chapels of all denominations enter Holy Week, remembering and celebrating that Jesus died and rose again for all people in all ages who believe and trust in the efficacy of his death for their sins. "Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. By his great mercy WE have been born again into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead" (I Peter I.3). We are an Easter people!

We do hope you will join us for the day! We don't have quite the history of Richard III but 21 years isn't too bad in Cursillo terms. Give away a way!

A year ago I invited us to consider the question "What is Cursillo?". At a meeting last November, Rev'd Hugh Burgess, British Anglican Cursillo's National Spiritual Director, asked that same question but in a particularly thought provoking way. When a fellow lift traveller overhears you mention the word or spots your badge and asks what Cursillo is, how do you answer? You haven't got long, so be brief and keep it simple, simple enough that it trips off the tongue without having to look anything up or dig deep into your memory!

The irony is that for many of us we might prefer to say what it isn't. It's not a secret society. It's not a separatist movement, sect, clique or denomination. It's not an exclusive membership club. It's not Spanish! I'm sure you could add more.

But what is it – in a nutshell? Try this in the lift: "Cursillo is a way of building strong Christian discipleship in local churches"? It's easy to remember and your fellow traveller now knows it's for Christians, within their church, not away from it, and it's about method not membership. Like a pilgrimage, it's about a journey, a way of travelling.

If you've got a few more floors to go before parting, your companion may want to know more about this 'way'. You could say "It helps Christians to develop their relationship with Christ and to keep growing in prayer, study and action." "How?" he or she asks. "People are invited to meet in small groups, seek spiritual direction, adopt a rule of life and participate in a three day course on Christian Living."

So what's so special about Cursillo? Surely it's the way we do small groups and a three day course. It's the simple tried and tested 'agenda' we have for each of these elements.

And now for a challenge! Have we traditionally seen our way of "building discipleship" as being mainly about getting people to participate in the three day course, with the small groups as an important follow up? Surely that restricts our contribution to only those for whom three days away is both possible and appealing. But small groups, modelled on our Group Reunion 'way', cost no money and little time, can happen at any time and in any place, and require no organising apart from agreeing when and where to meet. They can provide a source of growth for everyone. They can be our gift to every church.

And that is the challenge Hugh Burgess has set us: to make our 'way' of small group meetings available in every church in the land.

No secret – give it away. Give away our 'way'.

ULTREYA!

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A Cursillo Weekend

With what seemed like amazing planning a car with trailer pulled up at the Cursillo weekend venue. The driver announced "It's all here". In the trailer I expected all the items needed for the weekend. How different to my own diocesan Cursillo with the boxes spread over half a dozen people and cars.

Then I realised; this trailer held the things for the chapel only. Inside the chapel a dismantling worthy of the Reformation was going on with cross and chalice removed, altar taken, linen packed off. Then out came the Cursillo cross, chalices, linen, and so on.

As the years have passed this scene has stayed with me and from the experience of some years on teams I offer this dual cry now;

- Offer Cursillo lite
- 2. Use what is present rather than bringing it

If you will allow me, let me write about both of these things and see if they upset, confirm or inspire you.

Cursillo Lite

This is no reduction in the content of the weekend but in the amount of stuff carried to and distributed at the weekend. Boxes of material sit in garages and spare rooms across the country awaiting a weekend. Tissues in butterfly boxes, candles – so many candles, photocopied handouts, cloths, banners, bowls, and so on.

I have seen a handout chosen with care one weekend now added to weekend X along with all the other handouts as if they came from Moses' hand and must all be passed on. Who will have the courage to dispense with some or move their distribution from the first night to the go home back so pilgrims are not overwhelmed with reading matter.

I have a friend who loves to shop for clothes but whose rule is — one in one out. He buys a T shirt and disposes of one. Can someone in the secretariat take the role or authority to throw away or refrain from using some of the material and items that get taken to the weekends so that we all travel to the weekend lite of stuff but perhaps a little heavier with God?

Use what is present

In my doctrine course at Theological College I recall a profound moment as we looked at St Thomas Aquinas. He spoke of God's grace perfecting not replacing nature. As the years have passed I have made this a phrase that guides my ministry.



What does it mean? For Aquinas it was important not to decry or have a low view of the creation and the people in it. God's grace, his goodness and gift, comes to the world and especially his people, not to replace them but transform them. He perfects nature he does not replace it and does this by grace.

When we remove items from a venue and replace them with Cursillo ones without good cause I suggest we do the reverse of God's grace – we replace we do not perfect what is there. Deep down we know that on the weekend God's grace will be perfecting people and not replacing them; we and God begin where they are and with who they are. Why can't we enact that in the way we treat the spaces we are in? Use what is there, with gratitude.

I have a friend who is a landscape gardener. I worked for him once for a week and have seen his work on a number of occasions. Again and again he looks at what is there and begins to work, often using the plants and features present rather than ripping out and starting again. I feel he is instinctively a disciple of Aquinas and of God – to perfect what is there not replace it.

So here is my dual suggestion as you perhaps are already on team or awaiting the call;

- a) imagine arriving at the venue lite. What can be left behind if not discarded? What has had its day or just is not required this time? Imagine it is a budget airline and hand luggage is critical rather than boxes. What really needs to go and what is excess?
- b) look at the venue; the chapel, dining room, meeting room, prayer room. What is already there that you can use? What is there that cries out to be used? What is God placing before you before you get there that he can use for the weekend without you bringing anything? Think of perfecting rather than replacing.

Our new diocese, WYAD

Most of you will probably have heard about Bradford, Ripon & Leeds and Wakefield being merged into a much larger diocese known as West Yorkshire and the Dales (shortened to WYAD in this article). This has meant that the three former Cursillos have had to work out how they should merge into a larger Cursillo. Moreover the new diocese has been divided into five Episcopal Areas meaning that Cursillo has also had to follow suit.

Four of those Episcopal Areas are concentrated in the conurbations of Leeds, Bradford, Wakefield and Huddersfield/Halifax. The bulk of the people live here. The fifth Episcopal Area is to the North and covers a large area of the Yorkshire Dales which is sparsely populated.

With this very brief resume of the situation there follows an edited version of a Newsletter that was sent out to all Cursillistas in the five Areas.

"Many will have been wondering what is happening about the change from the three former Diocesan Cursillos to the new Diocesan Cursillo for West Yorkshire and the Dales.

A Steering Group was set up comprising the three Lay Directors, the three Spiritual Directors and two BACC Reps. We have also been fortunate to have the assistance and support of the BACC President Sally Henniker-Major and the Rev'd Hugh Burgess National SD and we have been meeting regularly for the past year.

There have also been a number of working groups, New Banner, Communications, Finance, Governance, Ultreyas and Weekends, and we are grateful to all who have given their time. As you can see from the lists of groups, there have been many things to think about as we move forward.

We think most will already know that each Cursillo has to cover the same area as a Diocese and have the permission of the Diocesan Bishop to operate. Each of the three former Diocesan Cursillo Bradford, Ripon & Leeds and Wakefield were also registered charities. As the former Dioceses no longer exist, we have to formally close the former Cursillos and to create a new West Yorkshire and the Dales Cursillo.

The Steering Group have had discussions with Bishop Nick, Bishop of Leeds and he has given his permission.

We have also spent a lot of time on how we will operate across such a large diocese and have drawn up a new constitution and applied to the Charity Commission to dissolve the three Diocesan Cursillos. They have advised we will need to form a new organisation and as we will have an income of more than £5000 we will need to apply to be registered.

So what is being proposed? There will be one Secretariat to cover the whole Diocesan Cursillo. It will consist of a Lay Director, Spiritual Director, Secretary, a Treasurer and an

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Assistant Treasurer. These will be the Trustees. There will also be, two representatives from each of the 5 Episcopal Areas (10).

It is very important that all the members (about 500) feel they belong to the new WYAD Diocese Cursillo and there will be Diocesan events which will include 2 weekends and 3 Diocesan Ultreyas a year. We hope you will make every effort to join together for them. We will also work in the five Episcopal Areas of Bradford, Leeds, Huddersfield, Ripon, and Wakefield. Each Area will be organised by a Servant Community who will be elected by the members of the area. There will be a Coordinator and an Area Chaplain (chosen by the SD) and a number of others to fill roles that each area feels it requires. The Coordinator and one other person from the Servant Community will be the two representatives serving on the Diocesan Secretariat. Each Servant Community will organise local Ultreyas and support 4th Day Groups and they will all work together with the Secretariat to promote Cursillo.

Finally to get to the most important part of the message, change is not easy but we have already made a good beginning. You will still remain in your familiar 4th day groups, and have local area Ultreyas and you will soon make new friends across the Diocese This is a most important opportunity to support the mission of the church by promoting Cursillo and we ask each of you for your prayers, commitment and support.

The Steering Group Ultreya!"

Since this Newsletter went out, former Ripon & Leeds has held its last AGM and has wound up its Cursillo and Bradford and Wakefield will hold their winding up meetings on 18 April. The Inaugural meeting to set up the new Cursillo is to be held sometime in May.

Whose family do you belong to?

Once in royal David's city, Stood a lowly cattle shed, Where a mother laid her Baby, In a manger for His bed:

That is where it all begins. Jesus – who is God – comes to earth and grows up in Nazareth. He goes to the supermarket with his mum and then goes to the well with her. He hangs around the carpenter's shop with Joseph and listens in on the conversations with other carpenters about where is the best place to buy wood. And all of a sudden everything changes. Everything is now holy because God – in Jesus – has been there. And because the Supermarket in Nazareth becomes holy, every supermarket everywhere in every time is now holy.

I think I was brought up in Church to think that the Church was God's family. Indeed sometimes at Baptisms I have talked about the baby being welcomed into God's family. I now tend to think that that was WRONG! Because of what happened in Nazareth the whole human family is now God's family.

That means that Christians are part of the Body of Christ; the group of those who have started to catch the wonder of knowing that they are loved by God and now want to follow Jesus. But the important thing is that the whole human family is God's family and every member of the human race is now my brother or sister in Christ.

That means that it must now be simply intolerable for me that for example 90,000 children in the UK (who are my brothers and sisters in Christ) woke up on Christmas morning homeless. It becomes equally intolerable that somebody is literally penniless because of an error in the benefits agency or because somebody has been sanctioned in a way that appears to lack any compassion, or that somebody works in a sweatshop thousands of miles away so that I can have clothes on the cheap.

We simply have to stop believing that some people matter less than others

There are lots of reasons why this happens. Most of it, I suppose, is to do with our own sinful nature. One of the reasons perhaps is that for many of us our experience of the human family is quite narrow. Many of us – if we are honest – tend to mix with people like us.

What I love about Street Pastors is that each Friday and Saturday night people – often older people, who are brilliant at this – go out onto the streets of our cities and they meet a whole group of young people whom they would never otherwise meet and their experience of the human family – which is God's family – widens.

What I love about Nightstop is that somebody offers an otherwise homeless young person a bed for the night and has a meal with them and perhaps hears a bit of what their

life is like and their experience of the human family – which is God's family – broadens.

What I love about the Gateshead Foodbank is the way that when people arrive they are met at the door and taken upstairs to a bright warm room and sat down and given a cup of tea and a biscuit and somebody listens to them – if they want to talk – and again the experience of the human family – which is God's family - broadens.

And when our experience of the human family broadens it becomes less easy to be simply critical. I have been really struck by a quote from Fr Greg Boyle: "Here is what we seek: a compassion that can stand in awe at what the poor have to carry rather than stand in judgment at how they carry it." That becomes easier when our experience of the human family has widened.

And our experience of what it means to be part of God's family broadens.

patterns of joy and discovery.


For all this, we cannot bear to look on him, for it would be with disgust or our own destruction.

At some point I'll have to leave them and head east. Aren't google, rail cards and Travelodge great when you need them!

In Blackburn we're all getting excited about Ultreya GB. I hope lots of you are coming 'The National' is always a highlight of my year; I've wonderful memories of inspirational services; forged friendships made and renewed; and lovely Cursillo welcomes in Coventry, Ripon, Durham, St Asaph, Canterbury and many other places. Blackburn Cathedral is in the centre of the town - as you can see if you click the link to the map which identifies parking places and the near-by railway station. One multi story car park beside the Cathedral is above a shopping centre and a market - the latter's worth a visit if such appeals to you.

Blackburn Cathedral was formerly the parish church of St Mary the Virgin, becoming a cathedral in 1926, when the Diocese of Blackburn was created. However architectural evidence showed the foundation probably dates back to the year 596, so this is one of the country's oldest churches and youngest cathedrals. Clear glass windows give the building a light airy feel but the colours streaming down from the lantern above the altar are stunning — so let's hope the sun shines when you come! The crown of thorns suspended above the altar is impressive too.

ACTION • <u>28</u> • ACTION from Blackburn - Ultreya GB 2015 When you come, don't forget to also look down at the floor and see all the fossils. (I reckon it's great when seated in winter, to slip off shoes to feel the underfloor heating) Around the walls inside 'The Journey' is displayed, a series of paintings by a local artist to form Stations of the Cross.,' and on an outside wall can be seen the "Healing of the Nations." This is a large, circular, steel and copper sculpture containing thousands of interwoven fibre optics. At night they create an ever changing pattern of light. However my favourite of all the Cathedral's works of art is undoubtedly, Josephina da Vasconcellos' sculpture of Mary Bathing baby Jesus. It was commissioned by the MU and is a lovely spot in which to pause for thought. I hope you'll come and see it all

The Ultreya GB link from this website tells you all you need to know about the programme and includes accommodation options. Take note that Blackburn Cursillistas are offering 'to put' folk up too – so use the link to ask. I've enjoyed staying with Cursillistas in the past, I'd love to reciprocate and if you want to stay longer, I'll show you further afield.

However you travel, wherever you stay, I look forward to seeing friends from the past and making new ones.


